When Sheila died the donations collected at her funeral were passed to the Austrey Gardening Society by her family with the express wish that bulbs should be planted around the village, as Sheila had always loved to see beautiful flowers.

Thanks to an intrepid band of volunteers most of the planting has now been done, but unfortunately the weather has never been on our side. When we planted snowdrops around the village trees it snowed. When we put daffodil bulbs in the verge outside the Vicarage, opposite Sheila's house, it rained – and now we're trying to complete the final batch of bulb planting in a very wet autumn.

Thankfully crocuses have now been planted in the wide verge on Main Road and a good selection of different bulbs should flower next spring in the grassy banks at the Village Hall. However, our final task is to put the remaining bulbs in the small, somewhat neglected Community Garden next to the footpath between Orchard Close and Newborough Close. We're hoping that when the bulbs flower here it will be the start of a whole new project, encouraging other villagers to help keep this area weed free and beautiful for everyone to enjoy in the future.

Austrey Joins the Eco-Schools Programme

Early in 2019, Mrs Zoey Moger, Teaching Assistant at Austrey C of E Primary School, took on running a Gardening Club after school and setting up an ECO Team. Mrs Moger is not green fingered at all so it was a case of winging it most weeks! However with a passion for kids understanding where our food comes from she achieved a few things.

The Eco-Schools programme is an ideal way for schools to embark on a meaningful path towards improving the environment in both the school and the local community while at the same time having a life-long positive impact on the lives of young people and their families.



The ECO Team was made up of 6 children supported by Mrs Moger, and looked into ways to raise money for the ECO journey. As they needed their set up costs to be covered, Mrs Moger contacted the Parish Council to see if they could support the school with funding for a couple of projects.

Recent strong winds had unfortunately damaged the greenhouse in the school garden so a new greenhouse was purchased and installed by Mr Moger. Vegetables will be planted and sold to parents and carers, and funds from this will be put back into the project on a rolling basis. The seeds and bulbs that Mrs Moger will be using have been sourced free of charge from various initiatives available to schools to help teach the children about where our food comes from, that it doesn't just come from the shelves in Asda (other supermarkets are also available)!

The ECO Team set a goal to become a Bronze Level ECO School by July 2020. We want to reduce our carbon footprint by recycling what we practically could. This has included recycling 4 large tubs of used batteries, recycling clothing that is no longer worn, and the purchase of recycling bins. A few other ideas are in the planning stages. Mrs Moger is also trying to set up a recycling area in the school's old chicken pen.

Without the support of the Parish Council the above would not have been possible. It is a slow process but we are working hard on achieving the goals we have set.
